

From Pastor's Desk...

In keeping with my most recent sermon (which by the time you read this will be a couple of weeks old), think about what the church for. What does it mean to say that we are the Body of Christ? That we follow Jesus, trying to live by his example, his teachings on faithful living? What role does the church play in its communities and the world at large?

A few years ago, I attended a vital congregations training. One of the speakers, remarking on the ELCA tagline, "God's work. Our Hands." said it leaves off the voice. He asserted that as Lutherans, we have a particular voice. I forget exactly what he thought the tagline should be revised to say, but I think a lot about "voice" and what it means to share that voice. What it means to share a voice of faith in the world today. I think about the world, how much it has changed since I was a child, how much it has changed over the lifetimes of my parents and their parents....

I grew up and church was a "nice" place to go. Believe in Jesus, God, "all that stuff," and you go to heaven when you die. Church was also a place where one had to be a certain kind of way in dress, manner, economic class, etc. If you couldn't at least pass... you weren't welcome. The church was a place of exclusion. That was the voice I heard, what I thought the church was about. And I was not interested. But little things here and there... and I got to experience glimpses of welcome and inclusivity. I got to see, hear, witness examples of people who loved Jesus- the Jesus who ate with "sinner and tax collectors," who made an alleged prostitute his first apostle, who spoke out against economic and social injustice- giving voice to those who had been excluded by the church... and those are voices I needed, and still need, to hear.

What is the church for? What is our voice? Who is in and who is out? Continue to think about these things throughout the summer. Think about what your ideal church looks like. Share with friends and family. Ask them to think about these things, too, and then listen to what they say- especially if it's someone not usually

sitting in the pews. Find out why. As we begin moving into the fall, I'd like us to share some of these stories together in worship and coffee hours.

Mystery


Death on the Page: A Castle Bookshop Mystery (©2020), by Essie Lang.



Cozy mystery, a quick read, simple writing. It was recommended by the bookseller at a small shop in Clayton last month, partly because it takes place in the Thousand Islands region. It's the second in a series featuring Shelby, a woman in her late twenties who goes to Alexandria Bay to help her aunt recovering from a knee replacement by working at said aunt's bookstore, and then decides to stay, also becoming a sort of amateur sleuth. In this story, an author who came to town for a book signing and research for her next book ends up murdered. And then it's found out that small items from the castle have been stolen. Are these things related?

History


A Queer History of the United States (©2012), by Michael Bronski.



From the Revisioning History series, this volume looks at US history and how the LGBTQIA+ experience has shaped American culture and history. Historical figures both widely known (like Walt Whitman) and not (like Augustus Granville Dill) are talked about, along with things like the ineffectiveness of sodomy laws in the colonies, how Merrymount was founded by Thomas Morton in the 1620s has a haven for same-sex desire, atheism, and interracial marriage, and about transgender evangelist Jemima Wilkinson, who led her own congregation in upstate New York after changing her name to "Publick Universal Friend" and refusing to use pronouns. Lots of interesting stuff, adding layers to, and filling out American history.

transforming: The Bible & the Lives of Transgender Christians (revised and expanded ©2023), by Austen Hartke.



Austen is a member of the ELCA with a MA in Old Testament/ Hebrew Bible Studies and founder of Transmission Ministry Collective, an online community dedicated to the spiritual care, faith formation, and leadership potential of transgender and gender-expansive Christians. I'm early in the book, still in part one, but from the foreword, Rebekah Bruesehoff, a teen/young adult of the ELCA, is quoted to say, "Being transgender means being who God made me to be." In the introduction, Austen says, "I don't think God made a mistake. I think God made me transgender on purpose." I'm looking forward to reading more, learning more about gender in the Bible.

Thanks for your continued sharing of the monthly newsletters. They give me a sense of connection to your faith community and my mom, who felt so much like Faith was "home". I also find them inspiring and hopeful. If you would, I'd love to pass along three thoughts I'd ask you to consider sharing with others:

1. I just LOVED Pastor Kate's topic of "welcomeness" and sense of belonging. It fits for faith communities as well as families and flows to all congregations and faiths. Please share my thoughts with her.
2. As a follow up to the above, I wanted to suggest an easy book I just started reading, "Doing Life with your Adult Children" by Jim Burns. It's an easy read and often makes "light" biblical references and some very practical advice. I've just shared it with my husband and will be encouraging my kids to read it so we can hopefully have some productive discussions. It's strong on "welcomeness" and keeping "judgey" comments silent.
3. I continuously see the quilts and think they are just beautiful. Sharing them as gifts to others is so lovely. I also have often wondered if they or perhaps one might be a source of income, say, through a raffle to a wider audience. Does your Facebook page have a larger audience/how broad is your mailing list? For example, the northern birds one might have very broad appeal. Could even be set up that if a minimum of say, \$500 isn't generated, then quilt is donated and funds returned. Could imagine individual tickets might generate a \$25 or \$50 chance...just a thought I wanted to share with the quilt group. Love their work.

Embracing Stewardship

“Embracing Stewardship” are not my words, but the title of a book I've been reading this past month by Charles R. Lane and Grace Duddy Pomroy.

This past February, I was assigned to the Stewardship Committee on church council for 2023. My first thought was OH NO!!! Then I turned my thinking to how would I address stewardship with our congregation. At the time, I thought stewardship only dealt with the church finances and church budgets. I was wrong, it is so much more. The book, *Embracing Stewardship*, helped me to see it is not only about the money, but living with a mindset of stewardship as an act of worship.

As a result, I've been observing the stewardship of time in our congregation. My observations are as follows: each week the altar is made ready for communion. Sunday music has been practiced and played during service. The sanctuary and fellowship hall have been vacuumed and dusted. The garbage has been taken out to be picked up on collection day. The church grounds have been maintained, and a couple of “chainsaw angels” have taken care of trees damaged in the last storm. The Zoom system is up and running thanks to the volunteers that spent many hours of trouble shooting. New light fixtures have been installed and the hallway is much brighter now. The offering from Sunday morning has been counted, recorded, and bills paid. Can you think of any I missed? If so, let me know.

This book has broadened my view of stewardship. It is not just about money. Simply put, it is discipleship at its finest because it calls into question our use of all that God has entrusted to our care: time, talents, and money. My goal this year is to enlighten our congregation's thoughts on stewardship. I hope to get us to think of the word, Stewardship, as a good word.
