From the Pastor's Desk...

I had lunch with a colleague the other week who remarked on how summer doesn't really exist once you get out of school. Even with some of the weird summer requirements of seminary (like CPE*), she had been used to summers off from kindergarten through her MDiv, and 20+ years later it still throws her. Because I took classes year-round for my BS and then MSW, I didn't really notice the "lack of summer" in my first post-MSW job. We saw kids from a few different area school districts and some of my co-workers had school-aged kids, so I was somewhat aware of the "start" and "end" of "summer," but it didn't actually make a difference to me. Time was just a blur in an agency that underpaid and overworked their staff (then wondered why they had such high turnover). But I notice the difference now as a pastor. The pews are emptier and I face them (instead of being in the pews), the altar is dressed in green for-ev-er, and the fan that works up front in the winter doesn't move much of the thick humid air. Now, I find summer is a good time for specialized sermon series (we're doing two this year!), and otherwise playing to worship formats, like our hymn sing on July 31, or having worship outdoors.

Summer, I'm discovering, is also a good time to really observe and take note of the habits, other interests, and priorities of a congregation, especially those to which a pastor is new. For example, even in congregations with few school-aged children and youth, the program year still coincides with the academic year. Just about everybody takes some sort of vacation in the summer.

One of our series this summer is focused on mission and discernment. So far we've covered the relationship of the Holy Trinity and asked "who is the c/Church?" Coming up we will focus explicitly on the

definitions of "mission" and "discernment," and talk about how they can be used to help us in our "program" and calendar years. What kind of things (e.g.: worship, community care programs, etc.) carry through year-round? Are there differences? What do these things say about who we are and what we prioritize? Likewise, what "pauses" do we take over the summer or other chunks of the year (e.g.: Sunday School, coffee hour, etc.)? What do these program or social pauses say about who we are and what we prioritize?

Here's another way to think about these things: our Inreach/Outreach chairperson, Katie B., is starting to work on developing this into an actual committee again. It's a big job since inreach and outreach covers two different already broad things. Inreach in other congregations might be called "social ministry" and be focused on things like social activities for members, or it might include a team of members who work with the pastor to visit homebound members. Outreach, by contrast, might be called "evangelism" in other congregations, and the focus is on going out into the community and meeting people where they are, sharing the Good News, inviting them into the congregation, being present at community events, and/or working on social justice issues that align with the Gospel of Jesus: hunger/feeding, poverty/living wages, sick/access to healthcare, etc.

How do you see Faith reaching into to care for one another? How do you see Faith reaching out to the community, to our neighbors and sharing God's love? How are you called to share in these things?

I hope you are each enjoying your summer hiatuses, whatever that may mean for you. Stay cool in these hot and humid days. Love your neighbor as you love God.

A few years ago, his novel *If Beale Street Could Talk* was turned into a (very good) movie. This novel, on my "to-read" list since seminary, is "set in the 1950s Paris of American expatriates, liaisons, and violence, a young man finds himself caught between desire and

conventional morality."
