

Dear Church

How do we find the words to pray?

As 21st century people, living in a confusing and conflicting world with little regard for the holy, how can we possibly know how to connect with God in prayer?

One great answer to those questions might start with some 500-year-old advice from Martin Luther, who along with being a Reformer of the Church and a towering Theologian, was also "Pastor Martin," concerned that his people know how to connect with God in prayer. He taught them from his own experience and struggles with prayer:

I do not bind myself to such words or syllables, but say my prayers in one fashion today, in another tomorrow, depending upon my mood and feeling. I stay however, as nearly as I can to the same general thoughts and ideas. It may happen occasionally that I may get lost among so many ideas in one petition (of the Lord's Prayer) that I forego the other six. If such an abundance of good thoughts comes to us we ought to disregard the other petitions, make room for such thoughts, listen in silence, and under no circumstance obstruct them. The Holy Spirit himself preaches here, and one word of his sermon is far better than a thousand of our prayers.

That guidance from *Luther's Works* is one of the nuggets of very old teaching that can be utilized in life-giving ways today. Like Luther's church members so long ago, do we not struggle to find words and form for our prayers? Do we not hope to find the place in prayer when our voice becomes still and the Holy Spirit enters in?

I am enthusiastic about sharing an invitation with you from the Council and me for the season of Lent. Together as a whole congregation, we are being invited to use a book of daily devotions, 40-Day Journey with Martin Luther edited by Gracia M. Gindal.

There is an article elsewhere in the newsletter describing the book and our plan in more detail, but the main idea is this:

- We will each be praying and reflecting each day of Lent – in different places and moments of the day – on the same questions and ideas, connecting us in a spiritual journey together.
- Our Lenten prayers, with the guidance of this little book of devotions, will connect us to wisdom from the Bible and church history to guide us toward being more deeply connected to the Living God in our lives today.

Pastor Martin Luther also wrote, "I will tell you as best I can what I do personally when I pray. May our dear Lord grant to you and to everybody to do it better than I! Amen."

His advice about prayer begins with a disclaimer about his own struggle to pray. He confides "when I feel that I have become cool or joyless in prayer because of other tasks or thought..." and he shares his approach.

Luther's honesty is an antidote to any sentimental idea we may have that prayer would be easier if we lived in a simpler time in the past, or if we were like one of the great spiritual leaders of the church.

Prayer is always a challenge; always something we need to take time to learn and practice; and always a powerful way of connecting to the insight, healing power, joy, and peace that God eagerly waits to share with us when we turn our attention toward God.

You are in my prayers, as I hope I am in yours. I pray that we will find a way to be God's people as a congregation, as a nation, and as individuals in these challenging times so full of need and of possibilities.

SUNDAY WORSHIP SERVICE TIME CHANGE TO BEGIN FEBRUARY 12TH

After lengthy discussion the Council has decided to change the Sunday morning worship time to 11:00am beginning on February 12, 2017. The Council decided unanimously after long thought and discussion over many months.

The news was first shared with the congregation at the Annual Meeting on January 22nd. More information follows, especially for those of you who could not be at the meeting last week. While some people were excited about the positive impact the time change will have, other members were upset or sad about it.

History: When Pastor Steve Cordes began serving both Faith Lutheran Church and Evangelical Church, both congregations were worshipping at 10:30am on Sundays. Evangelical changed its worship time to 9:00am; Faith gave up its 8:30am service. In subsequent years, Pastors Cordes, Hempel, and Wegter-McNelly each noted the problems with this schedule and strongly recommended a change.

Good things about this change:

- Both congregations will be starting in time frames that are within the desirable range of 9am – 11am.
- Faith can start on-time on a regular basis so that regular members can better plan their mornings.
- Faith can make a good impression on visitors and newcomers by starting at the scheduling time and sharing a well-prepared service.
- Worship leaders can check-in and be ready (choir warmed-up, sound system checked, liturgist and pastor checked in, Baptism families welcomed.)
- Special activities (e.g. a Bible study or special event) might be planned prior to the service.

Starting in February allows time to communicate the change in a variety of forms to all members, change signage, and update website, while also establishing the new routine in time to have a positive impact on Lent and Easter.

Process: Some members asked good questions and some expressed frustration during the Annual Meeting that this decision was made by the Council rather than by a vote of the congregation. I want to share why I recommended that the Council make this decision rather than debate and vote on it at the Annual Meeting:

- According to the Faith Lutheran Church bylaws, it is the responsibility of the Council to set worship service dates and times. So technically, it was the right process under the bylaws.
- Following a congregation's bylaws doesn't necessarily mean that a process is the best choice for the health and unity of the church. By this more important standard, I also feel that it was the best choice, though definitely not a perfect one. The congregation has struggled with the worship time since Faith began sharing a pastor without ever being able to come to agreement on a solution. Within the constraint of sharing a pastor, there are few workable scheduling options.
- Learning about Faith's bylaws and the past conflict and irresolution around this issue. I began a series of discussions last summer with the Council members about the significant pros and cons to either changing to 11:00am or remaining at 10:30am. There was a lot of concern for how difficult change is at Faith and recognition that this change would be very emotional or objectionable for some. We also talked about the original process years back to share a pastor with Evangelical Lutheran Church, and how that process had not been as transparent and participatory as hindsight tells us it should have been. The worship time conflict is an issue created by the much bigger changed that happened - in a less than perfect way in the past.
- The Council was torn because on the one hand, it was not a good thing to consistently start the worship service late. On the other

hand, it was going to be contentious and emotional to make a change. The Council eventually reached consensus. If they had recommended the change for congregational vote rather than taking responsibility for the change, I was concerned that the debate at the Annual Meeting would have been even more painful and likely divisive as people took sides. Whichever way a congregational vote went, because of the limited time we have at a congregational meeting we surely would not have reached consensus in the way that a small group working over a long period of time was able to do. There was the potential for hurt either way, but perhaps a greater chance of taking sides and damaging relationships if the process had been for the whole congregation debate.

There was no perfect choice for resolving this question and I am very sorry for the pain that the process and the plan causes' some of you. I have tried here to offer you a full explanation, but I don't expect this information to instantly make everyone feel better or agree with the process or the plan. I am definitely willing to keep talking about it with any of you. Just let me know and we'll take time to talk.

INVITATION TO A HOLY LENT: DAILY DEVOTIONAL BOOK AND SMALL GROUPS

This year, the season of Lent will begin on March 1st as we observe Ash Wednesday. Many Christians through the ages have celebrated this season as a time of special focus on the life and ministry of Jesus and as a way for journeying toward Holy Week and Easter. In worship and in our individual lives, we may mark the season with special rituals, study, or spiritual practices.

For Lent this year, the Council and I are inviting everyone to participate in a spiritual practice together using a daily devotional book: 40-Day Journey with Martin Luther edited by Gracia M. Grindal. Each day during the forty days of Lent has a theme, a brief passage from Luther, Bible passages, a brief prayer, and suggestions including questions to ponder and journal reflections. Each lesson can be done in 5 minutes or slowly over an hour depending on your schedule and interest.

These are some reasons we are excited about this:

- It's the 500th Anniversary Year of Rev. Martin Luther! This will connect some of his writings to our own spiritual practices.
- This book is good for all experience levels

 whether you are a beginner or an old
 hand at daily devotions.
- This is flexible for people who are local, homebound, or traveling, and whose schedules vary.
- We will be connected a spiritual practice even as we are reading and praying in different places at different moments of the day.

Next steps: sample copies and a sign-up list to reserve a book will be available at church in the coming weeks. We want everyone who would like a book to have one. If you are able to make a

monetary gift to defray the cost, the suggested donation is \$14.

Small Groups: During February, everyone will be invited to join a small group to meet once a week during Lent to share questions, discuss the book and enjoy time together. Daytime, weeknight, and a Sunday afternoon groups will be offered so that we hope everyone who would like to join a group can find one to fit your schedule.
