
May God bless us and guide us in 2017

INTERIM MINISTRY AND HOW IT'S CHANGING JENNIFER WEGTER-MCNELLY

During my first half-year as your Interim Pastor, two themes have often come up in conversation. The first is your consistent encouragement, support, and appreciation for my ministry with you. I am grateful for that all the time.

The other topic that regularly comes up often goes like this: "Are we going to call the new pastor soon?" "Why isn't anything happening?"

This desire to see progress and get to the end of the transition process is completely understandable. All the congregations I have served have felt this to a greater or lesser degree. Particularly if one is not currently serving on the Council or in some other leadership role, it can feel like nothing much is going on.

Actually, quite of lot of important work is happening – by the grace of God and through our faithful keeping on and learning new things together. Though it may not be as concrete as fixing the steeple, I can see that God is helping the congregation to know itself better, figure out what God is calling you all to next, and ultimately, calling the pastor with the gifts and skills to walk with you into that future.

At the congregational meeting later this month, I will be spending some time teaching about the tasks of Interim Ministry in general, and then making some observations about what we have been doing to accomplish these. I'll also offer my perspective about what I have been learning about your church and a preview of some of the plans ahead.

By way of background, I want to share with you a little bit about how Interim Ministry came to be and how it is continuing to change with the evolving needs of the broader church. (At the end, I have listed two good articles you might want to explore if you'd like to read further.)

Interim Ministry as a strategy and as a specialized area of training for ministers was developed in the 1980s. Mainline Protestants, including the Lutherans, realized that the transition time between called pastors offered both opportunities for learning and vitality, and the risk of the next pastorate going poorly if certain work was not attended to.

Five broadly recognized areas came to be recognized as essential to a successful interim time

in a congregation. They are known as the Five Developmental Tasks of Interim Ministry:

- Coming to terms with history (sometimes called Heritage)
- Discovering a new identity
- Negotiating shifts of power and leadership changes
- Rethinking denominational linkages
 (sometimes called Connections)
- Commitment to new leadership and a new future

These Five Tasks are not are not steps that happen one at a time or in any particular order. Rather, they are broad themes that consistently come up when congregations engage their transition time in a thoughtful, spiritually-grounded way. Attending to each of these topics helps a congregation to call a pastor from a position of unity and spiritual focus.

More recently, some new tasks have been identified. Because the fast pace of change in American culture in general has impacted the role of Christianity in our communities, church leaders have realized that other tasks are also essential for churches in transition. Simply doing a good job of the ways of being church that worked well in the 20th century isn't necessarily going to work in the 21st. A new paradigm is needed. Here are examples of some additional tasks for interim pastors and congregational leaders (from the Anthony B. Robinson article):

Six Critical Tasks for Today's Interim Pastor

1. Tend to the pastoral basics and do them well (e.g. planning worship and preaching, pastoral work, and church administration.)

2. Help congregations understand the seismic shifts in American culture.

3. Do a congregational assessment. ("Before change can or should be undertaken it is important to know, as accurately as possible, what's going on—what a congregation's current reality is.")

4. Revisit key texts and themes of scripture that most clearly address the nature and calling of the church.

5. When necessary and with suitable deliberation, make some tough calls (e.g. transitions in staffing, ending programs, or building issues.)

6. Provide encouragement. ("Many congregations need steady, if realistic, encouragement with regard to their strengths, their capacity to make a difference, and God's power to use and surprise them.")

Both the original Five Tasks and Anthony Robinson's suggested Six New Tasks are important themes I have consistently experienced in interim ministry with congregations...and there are more!

I look forward to sharing with you more about how I see these interim tasks happening at Faith – in my report at the upcoming congregational meeting, in future newsletters, and whenever you want to talk with me about this time of transition. I see that God has already done a great deal with us in these months together, and I am looking forward to diving into some new things together in the coming year.

SMALL GROUP STUDIES – PAST AND FUTURE JENNIFER WEGTER-MCNELLY

The milestones below reflect the necessary initial steps in the Call process:

- 1. Call an Intentional Interim Pastor. This has been completed and Pastor Jennifer is effectively and successfully performing this role. (June, 2016)
- 2. Assessing who we are, what we are about, and where we want to go. The Holy Cow initiative provides us with baseline information. (December 4, 2016)
- 3. Make printed copies of the <u>Vital Signs</u> <u>Report</u>, which resulted from the analysis of the 62 responses that were submitted by members of the Faith Lutheran

Congregation, available in the Narthex December 11, 2016.

- 4. Conduct a joint meeting with Evangelical where Kelly R. addresses members of both congregations and provides her counsel on areas of compatibility and difference as we journey forward together. December 14, 2016, at the Tamarac High School Library.
- 5. "Survey Data is not the end of a conversation, but a beginning." Receive initial feedback from members of our congregation. "Listening Sessions" with Council Members are scheduled for congregant feedback/conversation at 10:00 AM and at Coffee Hour on January 8 and January 15, 2017 in the Fellowship Hall.
