Ask the Pastor

Why is there a single pink candle in the Advent wreath?

Excellent question! First, the Advent wreath with its four candles for each week of the season, or five candles if you add a "Christ candle" for Christmas, is used for our personal or communal piety. Basically, some of us really like to have one to help us center our prayer and devotion throughout the Advent (and sometimes Christmas) season(s). Used in worship, it's symbolic rather than a requirement of corporate worship. To address the candle color question, some people like to use all blue (this is my preference), and some people like to use three purple and one pink. Blue is the liturgical color of the season symbolizing things like penitence,* hope, and royalty. The purple (or violet) candles symbolize repentance and fasting, while the pink (or rose) candle represents joy. In the Catholic Church (and some Lutheran, other mainline protestant denominations), the third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete (Latin for "rejoice") Sunday, so that's when the pink candle is lit. If there's a fifth candle, it's white symbolizing Christ and is lit during Christmas. When used in congregations, the white/center candle is usually the big, formal Christ candle.



If you are going to make/use an Advent wreath at home, you can use any colors you want. I like blue. Lowell likes the purple and pink combo. I have an old, round, metal one wreath that holds five tapers (pictured; it looks like 10y ago I had 3 blue and 1 pink. I don't know why). At one point Lowell had a glass tea light holder that was five spots in a line so he could order them however he wanted (e.g.: center the white, put the white at the end, etc.). You can use single candle holders arranged (and rearranged) on an end table.

*We tend to emphasize Advent as a season of preparation and hope more than its older meaning of introspection and penitence.

"What's with this new purple book?"

Way back in the days of early European immigration to North America, the Lutherans were known as "people of the book" because even though there wasn't much of anything they could bring with them on the

boat, they made room for their hymnals. Depending on your particular interests and curiosities, the history of Lutheran hymnals in North America is kind of fun to learn. But keeping it super short... back in 1978, after many years of collaboration between a few different Lutheran bodies, the LBW*- the green book- was published. It contained a couple of liturgies (settings) for communion, a few hundred hymns and became the standard worship resource for almost everyone that had participated in its creation, and then the ELCA when it was formed by merger in 1987. In 1995 the



ELCA published WOV- the blue book- as a supplement to the LBW. It added a couple new liturgies and just under another 200 hymns. A few years after that, work began on a new hymnal/ worship book, and in 2006 the ELW- the "cranberry" or "new red" book was published. Its 10 communion settings and several hundred hymns are comprised of roughly 80% LBW and WOV material, plus another ~20% "new" material. Over the last 10-15 years it has become the standard resource for ELCA worship and nearly every ELCA congregation uses it today. (There are still some using the LBW; but, really, get with this century already.) In late 2020, the ELW got its own supplement, the ACS, or "the purple book." It gives us a couple new settings, including one written with evening worship in mind, and ~200 new hymns and songs. Its content was put together keeping in mind the need for more worship material to address things like communal grief (see p.61-66). There are far more

hymns under special headings like "hope, assurance" and "lament" than there are hymns for particular seasons and festivals.

I think having used songs from it for the past several months and now copies in our pews makes us early adapters (esp. since there are still too many pastors and others in the area that don't even know it exists). As you've probably guessed... I LOVE this book! There's some expansive language for the Trinity, hymns that ask questions without defined answers, and the music itself comes from more places around the world giving a greater sense of the vastness of God everywhere. It also some of my new all-time favorite hymns. For those who are a little more wary of "new" things, there are several hymns that use familiar tunes, including some we've sung at least once, like #1000 "God's Work, Our Hands"; #1062 "Build a Longer Table"; and #991 "Go to the World."

The Bible, updated

The NRSV (New Revised Standard Version) is the English translation used most often by scholars for English study of the Bible. It's also the translation used most in the ELCA, including our Celebrate inserts.



Now, thanks to a project of/commissioned by the National Council of Churches, it's got an update. Without being a new translation, the NRSV Update Edition (or NRSVue) is still a literal translation that makes use of new knowledge by scholars in Biblical languages and cultures, etc.

It came out in some e-book formats last winter, and hard copies are set for publication this fall with pre-orders available online and at local booksellers. During our summer series, the scripture inserts used in place of the assigned Gospel readings were NRSVue, copy-pasted from BibleGateway.com (an excellent- and free- online resource for side-by-side comparisons of several different English language translations). Friendship Press, which put out the first e-book last winter on the Word at Hand app (pictured), offers more information about the


Reading
