**END OF MESSAGE** 

The story is still told today of the unusual account of how the news of the Battle of Waterloo reached England. The report from the battle ground back in those days was first carried by sailing ship to the southern coast and then by signal flags to London. When the report was received at Winchester, the flags on the cathedral began to spell out the "Wellington defeated." message. Before message could be completed, a heavy fog rolled in and with that heavy fog the gloom of a nation filled the hearts of the people. However, when the mist began to lift, it became evident that the signals of the Winchester Cathedral had really spelled out this triumphant message, "Wellington defeated the enemy!"

There can be no argument that our future is often colored by what we understand for the moment. Consider the experience of any crisis, transition, or conflict and how that immediate sense of reality influences our hopes and dreams for the future. Yet as Christians we believe the fog is still lifting. The message shall reveal itself ultimately, "Victory is ours!" St. Paul put it this way so many years ago when writing to the Corinthians, "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall understand fully, even as I have been fully understood. (1 Corinthians 13:12)

If St. Paul were to say it today, perhaps he would put it this way, "I may not know everything, but I always know just enough, to know I'll always be OK and that's enough for me!" That is the Gospel my friends. We can live, because we already know the end of the message. May that be enough for us all, always.

## **COUNCIL SUMMARY**

Research and analysis on financial options for the remaining annex mortgage balance was completed. A motion was made and approved to devote \$1,000 of the quarterly check from the Lutheran Foundation towards the annex mortgage principal. This motion would remain in effect when the funds are available and not required for another more immediate purpose.

Dakota Franklin attended the May Council meeting to discuss a proposed Eagle Scout project. The Council has accepted Dakota's proposal to build a reflection bridge over the creek as well as clean out the creek area. As part of the Eagle Scout project, Dakota is required to coordinate and complete the project and obtain sources of financing for the project.

A significant amount of money was received from the MacKenzie estate. The Council discussed how this money should be handled and the possibility of investing for the long term. Barbara Boord will research options offered by the ELCA Mission and report back to the Council.
