It All Depends on Where You're Looking

If you put a buzzard in a pen that is 6 feet by 8 feet and is entirely open at the top, the bird, in spite of its ability to fly, will be an absolute prisoner. The reason is that a buzzard always begins a flight from the ground with a run of 10 to 12 feet. Without space to run, as is its habit, it will not even attempt to fly, but will remain a prisoner for life in a small jail with no top.

The ordinary bat that flies around at night, a remarkable nimble creature in the air, cannot take off from a level place. If it is placed on the floor or flat ground, all it can do is shuffle about helplessly and, no doubt, painfully, until it reaches some slight elevation from which it can throw itself into the air. Then, at once, it takes off like a flash.

A bumblebee, if dropped into an open tumbler, will be there until it dies, unless it is taken out. It never sees the means of escape at the top, but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom. It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself.

At certain times, one could make the case that humans are no wiser than the buzzard, the bat, and the bumblebee. We struggle about with all our problems and frustrations, never realizing that all we have to do is look up! The escape route and the solution to so many difficulties is simply to look up... look up to the One who has already come down to make for us a way out forever. Knowing where to look makes all the difference in the world.


. Sunday School has officially started!! Our first day was September 16th, and we had a great turnout. We continued our start to the new school year with our official Rally Day on September 23rd. The children stood in front of the congregation and introduced themselves and told everyone what they were going to learn about in Sunday School. Some of the topics included caring, sharing, hope, love and giving. There were 14 children present for Rally Day, our best turnout ever! We ended Rally Day with a kid friendly coffee hour which was enjoyed by all. I hope that we can continue with the great turnout. It would be wonderful to see so many kids there each week.

Currently, the "pilot" plan for this year's education program is to have the older children (2nd grade and up) come in for an age appropriate lesson as soon as they arrive at church and then return to church before the service is over. The younger children (3 years to 1st grade) will continue to come in after the Gospel lesson and stay until the service is over. This will eliminate the need for more than one teacher, but allow for the older kids to engage in age appropriate activities. We are going to have to see how this works before we set this in stone, but at this point this seems like the most workable plan.

I am also continuing to look for volunteers to help out, especially the teens in the church. Depending on how the new plan works, we may need assistance with the younger children in getting them started on their lesson. The Upstate New York Synod is a Resurrection People who Pray First, Walk Together, and Change Lives. Join us in 'feeding the roots of leadership' by supporting in the capital appeal of the Upstate New York Synod.

Feed the Roots supports sharing and growing this faith with our young people through outdoor ministry programs offered at Lake Chautauqua Lutheran Center, Vanderkamp and the coordination of camping programs with various camps in the eastern area of the synod. The campaign will address significant capital and program improvements.

The campaign will 'feed the roots' of campus ministry programs across our synod as they nurturing discipleship among faith-filled students and seek to proclaim God's unconditional love to those who do not yet know Jesus Christ. Funds will strengthen campus ministries in Syracuse, Buffalo, Albany, and Ithaca, New York.

Feed the Roots campaign also supports Seminary Education at our ELCA seminaries as they identify, gather, teach, educate and nurture the church leaders of the future. Scholarship dollars will also support seminarians in our companion synods - the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zimbabwe (ELCZ) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zambia (ELCZa).
