

Pastor's Desk...

Most of us like music. Listening to, performing, singing along with our favorite songs. I'm almost always listening and singing along in the car and office. Music accompanies our lives and worship. It influences us in many ways. Maybe you remember a few weeks ago when I shared the sermon I'd started got derailed by a song playing on my Spotify "Release Radar" auto-playlist. I changed the whole thing for that coming Sunday and asked, like Jesus asked his disciples, "who do you say Jesus is?" Thinking about our different sources of information and influence- like what we read, listen to, what we see, and who we talk to- what do we each think about and believe about Jesus? According to the song that changed my sermon, Jesus was a drag queen (also the song's title), a feminist, a trans kid, and a radical, among other things. I don't think Melody Walker, writer, and singer of "Jesus Was a Drag Queen," believes the historical Jesus was a drag queen or trans (not that I can speak for her), but that she's being deliberately provocative to make a point about a vision of Jesus as radically inclusive, and as seen in each of us.

Sometimes I think about the stuff I ask you all in preaching, and this past month, I've been thinking about some of the music that has most recently influenced my thinking about Jesus, and the Divine in general. For the past year, I've listened to the album *Bible Belt Baby* by drag performer Flamy Grant more than anything else. The opening track, "What Did You Drag Me Into?" is a play on both the art of drag, and the feeling of "Lord, what did you drag me into?" that often accompanies the Spirit pushing (or dragging) us outside our comfort zones or otherwise disrupting our plans. The music video takes place in church with drag artists releasing the few attendees and their preacher from their drab confines. The second track, an anthem against shame, opens, "God is a storyteller/ A lover composing a letter/ And every word is hope and light and glory." In "Esther, Ruth and Rahab" she talks about growing up, being bored in church, and finding hope and courage in the stories of women, even

as the women around her were silenced. And I quoted the chorus of the final track, "Good Day" on Trinity Sunday, connecting God's multiplicity to our own as we have been made in God's image, by God, and good in every way.

The Gospel of Matthew, where we've been focused this year, talks a lot about the kingdom of heaven. The HighWomen sing, "All my heroes are going to heaven/ All the junkies and the liars and the fools" in "Heaven is a Honky Tonk." In other secular music, Brandi Carlile's "Stranger at My Door," a song that talks of exorcizing demons and selling souls, always calls to my mind Matthew 25:31-46. It ends, "But nothing scares me more than the stranger at my door/Who I fail to give shelter, time, and worth."

I contemplate, as I sing along with, "But them wafers ain't meat; they're just made of wheat; no one ever got drunk off of blood. So pass that wine around, my friends, redemption will just have to wait" in "Jesus Ain't Dead" by Gasoline Lollipops from their album, *Resurrection*. (I also wonder what it means that Jesus is "home asleep in bed and Elvis is cookin' him eggs.") Semler, featured in the Flamy's cover of Amy Grant's "It Takes a Little Time," sings about being queer and Christian. In their song, "Jesus from Texas" they sing, "I grew up a preacher's kid cleaning up after communion/ So I know that a church is not a way to live/ It's a weekly reunion." I wonder, what does it mean for the church to be perceived as a social club, and not a place of welcome, acceptance, affirmation...; that church is a place where faith is a commodity and not how we are transformed by God's love? Semler sometimes sings with Trey Pearson on his track, "Hey Jesus" after coming out but being told by the church they're wrong, "Hey Jesus can you hear me out/ I just wanna love like everyone else/ I was wonderin' could you love me the same?" Do we believe Jesus loves us as we are, or are there conditions?

As our gospel readings the next few weeks take Jesus into Jerusalem for death, and then Advent prepares us for his birth keep considering the question, who do you say Jesus is? What does music- the stuff you enjoy, that we sing in worship, and even what you don't like- say about Jesus and the Divine?



What the Pastor is Reading


Most of my reading the past month has been a binge of Louise Penny's Inspector Gamache series, but in between chapters I've also read:

A Man Called Ove (© 2012) by Fredrik Backman.



A very popular novel from ten years ago, Ove is a grumpy man, with exacting expectations of others. Through narrative flashbacks, life's many disappointments and his character formation are revealed. Taking after his father, he believes that what is right is right, even to the point of breaking friendships over the cars each drive. Grieving and thinking he has nothing left to live for in this confusing modern world, his plans for death are repeatedly subverted by "incompetent" neighbors and faulty materials. He is also adopted by a cat who has seen a few things.


The Carrying: Poems (© 2018) by Ada Limón.



Lowell and I spent a lot of time in bookstores while traveling this summer. This book was highlighted on a shelf at the independent bookstore we went to in Seattle because Limón is the US Poet Laureate, her second term began this September. This collection's poems cover race, in/fertility, a new national anthem, life and death, aging, and bodies. "On a Lamppost Long Ago"

Murder in the Cathedral (© renewed 1963) by TS Eliot.



By coincidence, I had picked this up at a used store in Chattanooga so that when one of those Gamache novels kept referencing it, I had it handy on a shelf to read. Back in 1170, Thomas Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury, was murdered in the cathedral. Eliot's play is written in poetry and prose, handling issues of faith, politics, and the common good. "The last temptation is the greatest treason:/ To do the right deed for the wrong reason."

Fall Worship Experiments



We're playing with our worship this fall! On the third Sunday of the month (17 Sept, 15 Oct, and 19 Nov) we're going to play with some of the elements of worship. In particular, the sermon is going to be a time of reflection and discussion with one another, asking questions, making scripture more alive in our lives. We'll try these things for a couple of months. If we like it, we'll

keep the experiment going a few more months before deciding on making it "permanent" (or not).

@ELCP our worship will intentionally include our youngest members of Christ's body in the different pieces of worship, and the sermon will be a time of dialogue and reflection with them. Bring the kids in your life and all their questions!

@Faith our worship and coffee hour will happen at the same time. Drink your coffee (or tea or hot chocolate or whatever cold beverage) and munch on snacks while we explore the day's scripture together.
